CONGRATULATIONS KELLY LAWSON - DEPUTY PRINCIPAL CRONULLA HIGH SCHOOL

On behalf of Plumpton High School and personally, I would like to congratulate Kelly Lawson, who following a merit select process, has been appointed to the Deputy Principal position at Cronulla High School. Kelly commenced at Plumpton High School in 2011 when she joined the school as Head Teacher PDHPE. In this role, Kelly built the PDHPE faculty to be of exceptionally high standing under her leadership, leading by example as an expert teacher and building the teaching, learning and leadership capacity of the faculty. In 2014 Kelly was provided an opportunity, through a merit selection process to become a Deputy Principal at Plumpton High School securing this position permanently in 2017. In her time as Deputy Principal Kelly has led, the implementation of our new Wellbeing framework that is embedded in the curriculum between years 7-12 incorporating three psychological frameworks (Choice Theory, Growth Mindset and Positive Psychology). This project was recognised with an ACEL (Australian Council for Educational Leaders) National Leadership Award for collaboration on the initiative between the Mitchell Institute, the Victorian Association of State Secondary Principals (VASSP) and New South Wales Secondary Principals' Council (NSWSPC).

In her role as deputy principal Ms Lawson has been responsible for assisting in the development and implementation of the School Plan that has contributed to the HSC success over the last three years at Plumpton. She has also built the capacity of other teachers in teaching, learning and leadership with many now leaders at Plumpton High School. Her contribution as a leader within the senior executive team has contributed to the significant cultural shift that is evident at Plumpton.

PARENTING TIPS - SUPPORTING YOUR CHILD THROUGH YEAR 12

Year 12 is one of the most important years of schooling and it's without surprise that there is an enormous amount of pressure on Year 12 students coming from parents, teachers, schools and the students themselves. This pressure is beginning to mount with the HSC Trial Examinations scheduled for Weeks 9 and 10 of Term 2. There are a number of ways you can support your son/daughter as he/she works through their final year of School.

Parents can do lots of things to help teenagers develop smart study habits. These skills do not develop automatically, and parents will need to be patient while these new habits develop and the old, unhelpful ones are discarded.

Start by planning study in two 50-minute blocks with a 15-minute break. One 50-minute slab of study is better than several hours full of distractions and interruptions. Give your son/daughter positive feedback whenever he/she completes a study block and ask them to talk to you for a few minutes about what he/she has been studying that afternoon/evening. This allows him/her to revisit their learnings and consolidate memory.

One of the most important aspects is healthy and regular eating throughout the day. You're aiming for consistent blood sugar levels; not sugar highs and energy slumps.

Your teenager needs an environment that encourages him/her to think and focus on their studies. The environment plays a significant role in concentration.

Distractions include being able to hear a television (even if it's in another room), talking, noisy younger children, a mobile phone constantly demanding attention when messages come in, or cluttered work areas.

Show how important schoolwork is in your home by keeping the TV off during study time and mobiles out of reach.

There is debate in the literature about whether listening to music while studying is helpful and I get asked about this by parents quite a bit.

Music may impair cognitive abilities when trying to memorise things in order, because a student may get thrown off by the changing words and notes in the song. Some research indicates listening to background music before a task/an exam can increase cognitive processes, such as attention and memory, through the mechanism of increasing arousal and positive mood.

Your son/daughter needs to reflect on why they want to listen to music when they are studying; is it because it makes the work more enjoyable and the time seems to go more quickly, or does it genuinely help him/her to 'zone in'? Is his/her memory recall as good when he/she studies with music as without? The short-term pleasures of the music may not pay off in terms of his/her longer-term HSC goals. However, each person responds uniquely to music so some discussion and possibly experimentation may be required.

Provide physical conditions that help concentration, such as good lighting, cool temperatures and a table or desk with a supportive chair. Studying while lying down interferes with concentration. The work area should be neat, have enough space for writing and reading, and should be kept clear of any clutter.

Try to make sure that your son/daughter spends time with family, and his/her friends. Sport and other enjoyable physical activities (including playing with pets) are a must and can assist with healthy sleep patterns. In Year 12, eight to nine hours of sleep per night is the goal and the importance of quality sleep cannot be under-estimated.

WESTERN SYDNEY UNIVERSITY YOUTH LEADERSHIP MASTERCLASS WINNERS

In Late Term 1 a group of our Year 11 students attended the Western Sydney University Youth Leadership Masterclass. Plumpton had 3 teams that competed against 40-50 teams from other Public, Private, Catholic and Independent schools.

Our Poverty and Homelessness Team made up of Kim Aba, Dave Tubongbanua and Sonia Prasad were the winning Team on the day. They solved a problem involving poverty and homelessness in Western Sydney, won \$1000 and ongoing support to implement their solution.

The Reduce, Reuse, Reimagining Team made up of Reza Miriam, Ronak Ram, Sharfay Farooqi, Ahmed Muhammed and Abdal Chughtai placed second.

Plumpton's Mental Health and Wellbeing Team of Maypera Esera Ebony Rushworth, Juliet Lui, Ysabel Jimenez also competed at the Masterclass.

MAJOR PROJECT FOR ABORIGINAL STUDIES HSC COURSE.

Please welcome to the Rostrum Taliah who has just completed her Major Project for Aboriginal Studies HSC Course. Taliah is going to outline the story behind her amazing artwork.

Taliah's Story

As aboriginal people don't have written language their stories are told in a variety of ways such as dance, dreamtime stories, orally and paintings. I have chosen to tell my story by using my totem, symbols and the knowledge of my nation, the Wiradjuri people from Tumut Brungle.

The background of my work is blue which represents the fresh water rivers within my community. The dot's around the snake is a symbol of how cold the water is in the Southern High Lands. The boarder that connects the circles represents the connections of each circle. The circles symbolises home/ community, past, present and future. I purposely kept the outside of the border blue because I wanted to show how aboriginal communities stick together and educating the younger generations.



My totem is a Red Bellied Black Snake. I have chosen to have 2 snakes, the smaller one on the inside representing myself and the larger one on the outside is representing my grandmother. The reason my grandmother is surrounding me, is a sign of protection. The foot prints are a representation of myself walking back and forth asking my grandmother about the past, present, future and always have that connection of home.

HSC MINIMUM STANDARD

What is the HSC minimum standard?

NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) has implemented the HSC minimum standard to help ensure that students have the key literacy and numeracy skills for life after school. Students in New South Wales will need to demonstrate a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to receive the HSC credential from 2020. The HSC minimum standard is set at level 3 of the Australian Core Skills Framework (ACSF). These skills are essential for everyday tasks and learning after school such as writing a letter for a job application or understanding a mobile phone plan. The standard is assessed through online tests across three areas: reading, writing and numeracy. The minimum standard online tests are 45 minutes long and include a multiple choice reading test, a multiple choice numeracy test and a short writing test based on a choice between a visual or written prompt. Examples of the tests are available on the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) website. Students who do not meet the HSC minimum standard can still

- Sit the HSC exams.
- Receive an ATAR for University applications
- Receive a ROSA
- Receive a HSC minimum standard report.

There are no pre-requisites for choosing subjects for stage 5 or stage 6. Students do not need to achieve the minimum standard to choose a subject they will study in stage 5 or 6.

Practice tests are available for students to sit at school to help them become familiar with the online test structure and for schools to help determine student readiness to meet the minimum standard.

Students will have two opportunities per year to sit the minimum standard online tests in each area of Reading, Numeracy and Writing, in Year 10, 11 and 12. Students will also have up to 5 years from the time they start the HSC courses to sit the minimum standard online tests. The tests must be administered by schools via a lockdown browser.

Disability provisions and exemptions: Students with additional learning needs may be eligible for extra provisions for the minimum standard online tests or be exempt from meeting the HSC minimum standard in order to receive their HSC. Students taking four or more Life Skills courses can be exempt from meeting the HSC minimum standard. Students studying Life Skills English will be exempt from the Reading and Writing minimum standard tests. Students studying Life Skills maths will be exempt from the Numeracy minimum standard test.

AMEX LEADERS OF TOMORROW

Plumpton High School Student Executive Council members are attending the AMEX Leaders of Tomorrow program. Leaders of Tomorrow is a leadership program for high potential students from disadvantaged schools. Designed to inspire and equip students with leadership skills, the program engages senior and emerging leaders from American Express, providing an opportunity to share leadership experience and insight.

Leaders of Tomorrow draws on the experience and knowledge of leaders within American Express who act as mentors in facilitator-led sessions. Structured over two days, mentors work with small groups of students on activities focused on communication, leadership styles, motivation and recognising strengths.

The program targets high potential Year 11 high school students who have been identified by their school for their leadership potential and demonstrated leadership abilities.

The program consists of two, three-hour sessions facilitated by the Australian Business Community Network (ABCN), held approximately eight weeks apart. It typically involves 12 students drawn from three different schools.

The first session engages up to six senior leaders within American Express for a one-hour, facilitator-led workshop. During this time, each mentor will each host a table of four students and present on a leadership topic for approximately three to five minutes. Students then participate in a Q&A before rotating to the next table.

The second session engages another six leaders within American Express for a two-hour, facilitator-led workshop, working with students to develop their personal leadership brand.

For both sessions, mentors are briefed on the activity in advance and share lunch with the students.

Plumpton would like to acknowledge the significant work of both AMEX and ABCN in supporting our students in their leadership journey that is transforming lives by increasing opportunities.

Congratulations to our students who participated in the Full STEAM Ahead program in 2019 and to team Phoenix whose Solar Blind prototype was one of the winners of the competition. The final day held earlier this term - Hackathon. Our students worked collaboratively in teams and created 3 working prototype devices based on ideas they developed.

The teams were: Bunker Jonesky - a can collector to be used in schools which would earn students house points if they collected cans and put them into the bins.

Lavaa - this device was a 'how are you' pad which can provide emotional support to students that are in distress or feeling they are being bullied.

Phoenix - a solar powered blind that operates automatically when sun comes out using the stored solar electricity from a battery.

'Full STEAM Ahead' provides interactive experiences for students in the areas of Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Maths (STEAM). The workshops reach more than 1,000 students, delivered both on site at the Powerhouse Museum, and also streamed live into classrooms across the country. The program gives students the chance to learn how to code, understand game design, create applications and use the Internet of Things. The program will also offer a range of interactive experiences, careers days and valuable work experience.



The Junior and Senior GAT Dance Group have rehearsed every Thursday afternoon from 3pm to 5pm, with additional rehearsals required closer to the performance date, while the Stage 5 Dance class have worked continuously throughout both terms in their dance classes.

The Festival consists of a number of NSW Public Schools Dance Groups who go through an audition process in April to be accepted into the showcase every year. Items need to include a theme and communicate this theme to the audience through the compositional process. ENGLISH

ENGLISH FACULTY PROJECTS & TOPICS

It has been an exciting, challenging and reflective term for the English faculty at Plumpton. From projects that have involved community outreach, to heavy preparation for HSC trial exams, the halls of F Block have been humming with the bustle of productivity. Before we dip into the topics that have been studied this term, we want to acknowledge the work by staff and students to continue pushing themselves to be the best they can be.

YEAR 7

In their second project for this semester, our exuberant year 7 cohort explored the world of storytelling. They were guided by their teachers to answer the driving question: "What makes a good story" (is it the characterisation? Is it the pace of the plot? Is it the use of innovative language techniques? Or is it a happy mix of all of these aspects?). In groups, students built their own stories and created their own picture books.





YEAR 8

What does it mean to 'Survive and Thrive'? Well with community outreach in mind, year 8 considered this driving question by investigating mental health resources available to the PHS student community. Students applied their knowledge of purpose, audience, form and context to their research of informative texts throughout PE and Science. Year 8 English Coordinator, Mr Hartmann says, "The best part about this unit is the way in which students get to use the skills learned in english to present their understanding of the content learned in PE and Science. It's full PBL in action."

This research was gathered in their groups, where they each created a presentation and flier that will be presented to year 7 in a whirlwind 'Survive and Thrive' marketplace in week 10. Groups have investigated topics and resources including: Salvation Army, Beyond Blue and PCYC, just to name a few.

YEAR 9

Wherefore art thou Romeo, you ask? Well year 9 have been studying the Bart's arguably most famous play, Romeo and Juliet. After analysing the text through the thematic lens of 'conflict', their task was to produce a modern adaptation of the play. Students individually created a film proposal for their adaptation, along with a film poster. Ms Rose was impressed with the work her students produced, "It was nice to see students engaging with Shakespeare, and using their creativity to come up with their own modern adaptations." Year 9 student Amy Ngyuen says, "it was great to learn about such a famous writer, and see how his work can inspire us still today."

ENGLISH

CONTINUED FROM PREVIOUS ...

YEAR 10

Shakespeare was in the water this term, with year 10 studying the tragic Macbeth. With passionate debates over who was responsible for the tragic downfall of one of Shakespeare's most infamous characters, students turned their persuasive arguments into discursive pieces, where they had to convert their ideas into balanced discussions. Discursive writing is an important skill that has been incorporated into the new stage 6 syllabus, and this assessment has been a great opportunity for students to build their skills.

YEAR 11

The **English Standard** course explored their 'Contemporary Possibilities' module, by studying the true crime podcast, Serial. The series investigates the true story of a teenage boy accused of murder, and follows a renowned journalist on her investigation. For their assessment this term, students continued on in their own investigation of what they believe happened on the day in question. They applied skills of research, reflecting on the information presented them deconstruct how they are positioned as responders. They then composed their own podcast to evaluate and justify decisions they made and conclusions they came to on their journey.

English Studies course has been exploring how language is used in the world of Sport. Students have investigated news articles and excerpts of biographies to analyse how media portrays athletes at their good times and especially at their worst times. Currently they are exploring the factors that contribute to an athlete falling from grace and how the media sensationalises certain indiscretions that end up having negative ramifications for the athletes involved. This has seen students debate issues in class and use their skills from junior English to write persuasive pieces on the topics.

The **Advanced Course** have been exploring dystopian texts and speculative fiction looking at the way in which authors challenge us to think about the world and where it is heading. Students are critically analysing the ways in which composers critique social and political constructs and developing their skills as evaluative thinkers.

YEAR 12

HSC English Standard students completed a close study of the work of Oodgeroo Noonuccal poetry. They explored how her poetry and her use of language conveyed her rediscovery of her Aboriginal Culture. The students have worked tirelessly on analysing her suite of poetry and using knowledge of Aborignal Culture to connect to the Chinese culture explored in the set poems. Students have also been prepping for their HSC Trials that are in Weeks 9 & 10, this has seen them draft multiple essays and written responses, improving their skills in English. The Standard teachers wish Year 12 luck as they sit their Trial Examinations.`

English Studies spent the term exploring who they are as individuals and how this is influenced by the world around them. They read extracts from The Happiest Refugee and learnt about Anh Do as a refugee, artist, writer, performer and comedian. The students put in 100% effort and worked to the best of their ability to learn about themselves and develop their understanding of factors that make up a positive sense of self. They learnt about effective storytelling elements and used this to begin drafting their own creative writing piece. The Studies teachers wish Year 12 all the best with their Trials and hope they have a safe and enjoyable break.

HSC English Advanced students have been braving the Bard and getting their teeth into Shakespeare's Henry IV. They've been looking at the ways in which humanity can help to shape leaders and discovered that there is a little Falstaff in all of us. Students have engaged with the work of literary critic's to build their understanding of why Shakespeare matters building a strong understanding of the importance of his work more than 400 years after it was written.

YEAR 7 ALROY PARK INVESTIGATION

As part of the Year 7 unit of work, Landscapes and Landforms, students have been asked to consider a use for Alroy Park which is located just behind Plumpton Primary School. After making contact with Blacktown Council, it was discovered that the council is currently undergoing surveying to decide what to do with this piece of land. Our Year 7 students have been given the opportunity to design a plan and suggested proposal of what to do with this land and present it to the Blacktown Council early Term 3. In order to get a deeper understanding of what the Park could be used for, all of Year 7 attended a short excursion down to Alroy Park with their HSIE teachers where they conducted field sketches of the land. Students are currently in the process of creating surveys which will be sent out to the Plumpton Public to help them determine what could be done with this piece of land that will benefit all stakeholders within the are. Watch this space (or Alroy Park)as you might just find that some of our students had a significant hand in deciding what changes are made to benefit our community.







MATHEMATICS

RMF REPORT

Here in the Mathematics Department of Plumpton High School we believe that students can be successful in Numeracy if we are able measure the competency in Numeracy. We diagnose where they are at and provide opportunity to them to build their skills by providing targeted activities that address their needs and also challenge them. These activities are aimed at building their basic Numeracy skills as well as Mathematical reasoning and Problem Solving skills.

In Year 7, RMF lessons are run once a fortnight. Students work in their ability groups; learning in collaboration with students of their own ability. Activities include tasks that require concrete resources as well as reasoning. Working with others students of their ability provides all students to confidently contribute equally without hesitation.

Like Year 7's, the Year 8 also work in group level during RMF activities which are run once a week. While working in their levels, students are exposed to the next level up as well and they themselves realise that there are skills they are lacking and are willing to learn from each other.

RMF activities are run once a fortnight in Year 9. As students are already graded into pathways, their activities comprise of activities related to what they are being taught in class at the time. These activities target some basic numeracy skills but the major emphasis is on Mathematical reasoning and problem solving.

RMF activities are making a positive change in how students attempt questions in assignments, project work and examinations.







MATHEMATICS



"WORLD OF MATHS"- YEAR 8 INCURSION

On Friday the 5th of April, all students from Year 8, and some students from Year 7 Jackman engaged in a school incursion run by World of Maths. The students' problem solving skills were tested through 17 different puzzles and challenges focussing on the different strands of number patterns, space, measurement, graphs, statistics, logical thinking and sequencing, and mathematical understanding.

Students were collaborating in small groups at each of the 17 work stations. Discussions about how to solve the problems, possible outcomes and mathematical reasoning could be heard. Many of the groups successfully completed the challenges, but it was especially good to see the teamwork and cooperation exhibited by all groups. The students did really well and were thrilled to see application of mathematics and being hands on. No doubt their confidence and skills in problem solving and mathematical reasoning have been sharpened and that they enjoyed the challenge!

CYCLING EXPEDITION


Plumpton High School has always encouraged students to take a greater interest in physical activity due to its significant impact on general wellbeing and the dimensions of health. Students who are regularly active and in better health are also more likely to achieve long term benefits. These are outlined in the graphics below.

Mr Bell started the Fitness Mornings initiative earlier this year to provide students with an additional opportunity to become physically active. Every Tuesday morning, students braved the early start to begin the day sweating! Students participate in 45 minutes of fitness related activities ranging from jumping, running to various forms of resistance training. As nutrition is also a key element to being healthy, students who participated in the fitness session were provided with a nutritious breakfast.

To reward the students for their consistent attendance in the Fitness Mornings sessions, an excursion was organised. On Tuesday 18th June, 19 brave students brought their bikes to school and went on a cycling expedition along the bike path on the M7. In order to receive their qualification, students had to complete an online learning module and then participate in a 6 hour workshop which consisted of theory and practical elements. The facilitator of the training was really impressed with the pre-existing knowledge our students held - a testament to the quality of the teaching and learning taking place in Preliminary PDHPE. The facilitator also made special comment on the behaviour, manners and general attitude of our students. In the workshop, students worked individually to complete a quiz and also in small groups for practical activities such as CPR, rolling a casualty into the recovery position, bandaging and administering the EpiPen.

YEAR 12 CONSTRUCTION

The Yr 12 Construction class received a request from the Science faculty to construct a concrete slab on the agriculture plot on which the sheep could be cleaned. This task was well suited to the construction class and the units of study that are required to be covered, namely, erecting and dismantling formwork and concreting simple forms.

Students managed the process from start to finish including preparing and levelling the site for formwork, calculating the project costs and risk assessing all processes undertaken.

However all good planning is still subject to the weather conditions and the concrete pour had to be delayed a month because of rain.

When it was time to execute the activity everyone was well prepared and all students performed their respective tasks as planned, from gathering and carrying tools, screeding, floating to cleaning and storing tools and equipment.


ENGINEERING

Engineering in 2019 has been very exciting. The year 7 Engineering class completed Bottle Rockets. These machines are built using soft drink bottles with cardboard wings for stability. Some of these rockets flew 10 meters high!

The year 9 and 10 students were given the task of designing and building a bridge using paddle pop sticks. It had to span a distance of 600mm and could only contain 200 paddle pop sticks.

These bridges were tested to destruction using a bin full of water. The best bridges were able to support 15kg! After the test the student analysed the strengths and weaknesses of their designs.

Finally, the year 8 students designed and built cars powered by a mousetrap. The design included laser cut wheels however the rest was entirely up to the students. These creative designs belong to Jake Inskip-Clark, Lauren Kennedy and Natasa Raketic.

STRUGGLING WITH AND GETTING HELP WITH ASSESSMENT TASKS?

Here at Plumpton High, we have a dedicated Learning and Support team ready to offer assistance to all students. This includes a dedicated senior study for our year 11 and 12 students. But what is the best way to access this help? The following will give information for both students and parents on how best to tackle the assessment schedule.

With some exceptions, you can expect one formal assessment task, each term, for each subject you do. Students are handed their assessments in class and all sign a form to acknowledge:

- They have received the task
- They know what it involves
- They know when it is due



So how can a student access some extra help? First of all, students should ask questions on the day they are handed their assignments. There is a dedicated time where the class teacher will discuss and explain in detail, what is required. This includes going through a marking rubric which explains what is involved in getting top marks for each section. Paying attention in this session can eliminate stress later, when students realise they missed some key points or tips. Key questions here, generally leave students with a good understanding of what is required. Several subjects also offer lunch time tutorials for students requiring more explanation and these can be accessed by anyone doing that assignment, regardless of what class you are in. If you are still struggling or have some follow up questions, make a time to speak with your class teacher. This can be before or after school, or at a lunch time. It may even be for 5 minutes during a lesson in that subject. Then get cracking and hand in a draft piece of work for your teacher to check. This can be a two minute exercise of "sir/miss, I have started the assignment. Can I show you what I've done so you can tell me if I'm on the right track?" Don't forget that you can hand in drafts for formal feedback prior to your assignment being due. Generally speaking, drafts can be given to your teacher up until 2-3 days before the assessment is due. This allows teachers the time to look at your draft properly and give you feedback so you can make any suggested changes/improvements.

If a student has done all these things and is still struggling, then it is time to come down to the Da Vinci Centre in the Library and speak with the staff here. We will ask you if you have done everything mentioned above. If you have and you still need some help, we will make a time to sit down with you one on one and look at your assignment. To limit the impact on other subjects, this will generally be in break times, or before/after school. Sometimes we may withdraw you from a lesson. It is a case-by-case decision.

IMPORTANTLY...coming to the Da Vinci Centre the day before, or even the day an assessment is due is too late. We don't do your assignment for you. We will work with you to clarify key points and outline the best strategy for you to complete the work.

For Parents: If you would like to know what assessments your children have, check out the Plumpton High School- SkoolBag app. Simply download the app on you iphone or android device, click on assessments, then click on your child's year group and the assessments will be there for you to download. Of course, if you ever have questions relating to your child's education, you can always call the school and ask to speak with their teacher/teachers.

THE ACCELERATED READING PROGRAM

Our Accelerated Reading program has had a fantastic start to the year and keeps getting better. Our Year 7s have really enjoyed the reading and we have already seen some of our Year 7 & 8 students join the 1 Million Words Club – and more.

At the end of each semester, we test each student to observe growth in reading levels. If a student has been regularly reading and completing quizzes, we should see a steady growth. There are times when a student's reading level may decrease, however this is usually because they have not fully participated in the reading, they are reading above their reading level, and so not fully understanding the book, or they are not focussing on their book properly and so not able to answer all the questions when completing the assigned quizzes. This year, we have been able to include the Accelerated Reading scores and levels in each student's report, along with an indication of the effort that they have put into their reading. WE hope this helps yu as you support your child an encourage them to read more.

TROPFEST CHALLENGE



Each faculty has been presenting a different Learning to Learn Skill (L2L Skill) on assembly throughout the term to show the essential skills all students should practise and develop in order to be successful learners and be the best they can be. These skills include: Concentration, Communication, Cooperation, Managing Impulsivity, Positive Thinking, Reflection, Goal Setting, Participation, Questioning and Listening. Both students and staff members from each house (Dangar, Halkirk, Karinga and Woodstock) worked together to create a one minute video which demonstrated an understanding of each skill as they organised filming equipment, wrote, starred and directed in their videos. These videos will be used as a learning resource at future events and to support the importance of PACE in the classroom and to help shape Plumpton High School students as active citizens

who are inclusive of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures in the community.

On Friday 24/5/19 Plumpton High School acknowledged National Sorry Day. The day say the entire school engage in an assembly chaired by student leader Chloe Thorley, as they listened to Taylor Brookes give the Acknowledgement of Country and Taliah Hunter deliver a sincere speech about the Stolen Generations. As a group they discussed the theme: 'Grounded in Truth – Walk Together with Courage' in relation to their understanding of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures. They also shared their ideas and experiences on how they have come to value and promote intercultural understanding within the school community in order to recognise, value and engage with Aboriginal cultural experiences.



BANGARRA DANCE THEATRE PERFORMANCE

On Wednesday 19th June, students who previously participated in the School Spectacular Aboriginal Dance audition were invited to watch a performance of Bangarra Dance Theatre's Wilay Performance of Unaipon at the Sydney Opera House Drama Theatre. Unaipon is a monumental work about the man, David Unaipon, on the Australian \$50 note. The work tells of David Unaipon's belief that Indigenous and non-Indigenous people could co-exist as equals despite the incredible challenges he faced during his lifetime.

Students left the theatre inspired and mesmerised by the dancers and the story behind the dance. They were also fortunate enough to participate in a live Q&A with the artistic director, choreographer and dancers from Bangarra Dance Theatre Company where students learnt more about the choreographer's vision and the life of a professional dancer.

This term, Pasifika and Maori students from Years 7-10 of Plumpton High School were exposed to various pathways to University, scholarships that target skills and academic rigour by attending various workshops conducted by Western Sydney University (WSU) at Plumpton High School. They explored various themes that highlighted study habits, goal setting and career action plans and engaged in discussions that examined cultural stereotypes and stigma of Pasifika and Maori people.





MANAGING MY PASS OUT CARD RESPONSIBILITIES

INFORMATION FOR YEARS 11 & 12'S:

As a Year 11 or 12 student at Plumpton High School you have been provided with a 'Pass-Out Card' that will allow you to enter and leave the school at different times to that of junior students (Years 7-10). Plumpton High School sees the Year 11 and 12 students as young adults and as such the school seeks to provide a level of responsibility equivalent. Outlined below are the expectations and guidelines associated with your Pass-out Card.

- 1. You will only be permitted to leave the school if YOU have YOUR Pass-Out Card
- 2. If you do not have a class Period 1 you may arrive at 10am
- **3.** If you have no class P4 you need to leave during lunch 2 (gates are locked at the end of lunch 2, if you are still here you need to be in the library)
- **4.** All students to be present Period 2 and Period 3 = Senior Study or Library
- 5. You may attend the shops Lunch 1 and Lunch 2 with your card
- 6. You need to return before the bell goes at the end of Lunch 1 or Lunch 2
- 7. Food purchased at the shops is to be consumed at the shops (please do not buy for juniors).
- **8.** If you attend TAFE you are to depart at 1:00pm unless alternate permission is granted.

Note: The front gates are closed during the course of the normal school day. Please ensure you enter/exit at set times to reduce inconvenience to office staff.

Should you make decisions and take actions that contravene the expectations and guidelines associated with the Pass-Out Card the privilege may be removed.

The email should state the following: your name (first & last name), your child's name (first and last name) and what year they are in. She will then add you to her Parent/ Carer contact list. This will enable her to send you a graphic displaying your child's attendance record for the term. The graphic will be sent as an email attachment (Word file). This will be a quick form of communication if she has any attendance concerns regarding your child.

In 2013, the school has introduced a new attendance tracking system, that has removed the need for paper rolls and runners to collect the rolls. Teachers are now marking rolls electronically in class, giving the school instant data on student attendance in class (as shown below). The new system has been an instant success giving all staff access to an excellent attendance profile of all students, so that any concerning patterns of attendance can be addressed promptly. Remember that there is a very close relationship between high attendance and student success. To encourage students to set high standards for attendance, 3 awards will again be presented at Presentation Day & Graduation in 2019: Gold, Silver & Bronze Attendance Awards.
