PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Dear Plumpton High School students, parents and carers,

Term 3 at Plumpton High School has been a resounding success with vast opportunities available and continuing for students in all years. We have seen our 2022 Year 12 HSC Cohort including our first Jackman Unit class complete their 13 years of schooling culminating in their Graduation Ceremony, Bonze and Silver Duke of Edinburgh Adventurous Journeys completed, Year 10 Career Path Planning and Mock Interview processes continuing, the nomination, election and induction of new School Captains and Prefects forming the Senior Student Executive Council representative for 2023, completing of the House Captain nomination and election process, UTS U@Uni program continuing with our first cohort graduating the program, participation in the Day of Artificial Intelligence (AI) placing 2nd and 3rd in Australia, UNSW Gateway program continuing as with the WSU Fast Forward program, Haka Warriors program, staff participating in professional learning around developing further Plumpton's High Potential and Gifted Education (HPGE) program, continuing implementation of Plumpton's Restorative Practice Framework to support student engagement and more.

 demonstrate your best work every lesson throughout the whole course and catch up on missed/ incomplete work

- complete set classwork in class, consolidate work at home and complete prescribed homework
- complete to the best of your ability and submit all Assessment Tasks by the due date, participate in class discussions, experiments, complete major works, speeches, group work, presentations and other experiences in the course

This can only be achieved by being at school and in all classes.

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I wish all students well in their final term in 2022 as they continue their educational journey. I encourage all students to continue striving to be the best that they can be, support their peers and teachers in this endeavour. 


EMMA WILSON \$20,000 WSU FAST FORWARD SCHOLARSHIP

POSITIVE PSYCHOLOGY YEAR 7 WANTS AND NEEDS LESSON

During this lesson the students in 7 Da Vinci identify and describe the basic needs required by humans. Students identified the difference between a want and a need, apply the basic needs to real life scenarios and select and explain our most important 5 Basic Needs.

Mr Canning and Ms Kumar are the two Positive Psychology teachers for Year 7 at Plumpton. Should you need to discuss any wellbeing aspects of your child's learning at school please contact their Positive Psychology Teacher in the first instance.

Plumpton High School students from years 7-12 are engaged in the school's Positive Psychology Student Wellbeing Program that is part of each student's timetable. The students Positive Psychology Teacher teaches their class from year 7-12 and is their primary pastoral care contact at school. Plumpton implemented this model in 2015 and it replaces the old Year Advisor structure many people would remember.

The teachers are trained in 3 psychological frameworks: Choice Theory Reality Therapy, Positive Psychology and Growth Mindset. The school is presently adding Restorative Practice to our whole school Wellbeing Framework adding additional structures to support students develop lifelong habits and practices enabling success as global citizens and the leaders of tomorrow.



The UNSW Gateway Admission Pathway is an early conditional offer for students in Year 12 attending Gateway schools or eligible for the UAC's Education Access Scheme based on SEIFA criteria.

It significantly adjusts the ATAR requirements for your preferred UNSW degree and provides students with an early conditional offer to UNSW.

DAY OF ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE (DAY OF AI) - CONGRATULATIONS YEAR 8, 9, 10 STUDENTS

Students learnt about recommendation systems and how social media platforms use AI in those systems to differentiate content for different users. In building their own recommendation system, students consider the types of data recommendation systems use to make recommendations and how AI filters the content we see. Using an ethical matrix as a guide, students discuss the social implications of these filter decisions for us as individuals, and as a society.

Students learnt about machine learning (ML) and explore "image classification" as a way for computers to categorize what they see into different buckets. Seeing how computers learn in many ways like young babies, students use App Inventor to code their own "Peekaboo" game with a customized Personal Image Classification (PIC) model. Students look at how bias appears in Al classification applications beginning with facial recognition apps and discussed methods for creators of Al to eliminate or reduce bias in their applications.

Congratulations Caiden Bond & Alice Ton who placed 2nd in Australia in this year's Day of Al competition competing against over 200 schools nationally. Caiden and Alice also won a JB HIFI gift voucher, valued at \$200 each.

Caiden and Alice developed an Al-driven idea to use a robot to assist in hospitals to address the relevant and timely issue of Australia's stressed hospital and healthcare system that was fantastic. The thinking was outstanding, particularly, it was clear how much thought and effort went into their idea, such as the description of the QR code application and their idea to use exisiting



medical textbooks as data sets was brilliant and demonstrated how much they learnt throughout the day. The thinking and creativity that went into their pitch to bring the technology to life was excellent.

3RD IN AUSTRALIA, CONGRATULATIONS EWEN NEOH & ANNACEMONE NASHID DAY OF ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE (DAY OF AI)

Congratulations Ewen Neoh & Annacemone Nashid who placed 3rd in Australia in this year's Day of Al competition competing against over 200 school nationally. Anna and Ewen also won a JB HIFI gift voucher, valued at \$150 each.

Ewen and Anna developed an Al-driven idea to develop the Tutor-Bot, an Al robot that would provide tutoring to all students that may not have in-person access due to timely issues such as COVID-19 or accessibility issues. It was fantastic and great to see how much thinking and creativity went into their pitch to bring the technology to life.

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
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Completed Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award Adventurous Journey




















DUKE OF EDINBURGH SILVER AWARD ADVENTUROUS JOURNEY


YR 12 SOCIETY & CULTURE PERSONAL INTEREST PROJECTS

DAY OF AI (ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE)

Technology is changing the way people do things in every part of the world, and the sector continues to expand. What are schools doing to prepare the next generation for the future?

The truth is that educational institutions are already doing a great deal of work in this area. In fact, everything we see today in our everyday life can trace its origins to research, and an academic paradigm that brought on board policymakers, scientists, and governments.

The initiative of "Day of AI" was launched in Massachusetts this year following the state's highly successful STEM week. The TDM Foundation has brought the Day of AI to Australia.

On Wednesday, 27 July 2022, Year 7 to 10 students from secondary schools across Australia were invited to participate in a day of creative, fun, and hands-on activities to immerse themselves in Al. Topics covered everything from the basics of what Al is, to design and creation of exercises using Al and understanding the benefits and potential risks.

The activities were designed to be easily delivered by teachers with little to no background in computer science and digital technologies and to be accessible to students of all abilities.

The Day of AI is supported by the TDM Foundation, CS in Schools, the Australian Academy of Technology and Engineering, and Teach for Australia.



The reenactment discusses the impact of this scenario and displays the processes that the emergency services have to undergo when attending a car accident scene.

One speaker, Tristan, was from the Mt Druitt community and discussed his own personal experiences and struggles that he has now had to face due to his own recklessness when riding a motorbike.

YEAR 11 PDHPE - FIRST AID COURSE

In Year 11 PDHPE, students study the First Aid unit as one of their options. Throughout the unit, the students learn the knowledge and skills required to manage basic first aid scenarios and administer cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). The content is presented through a combination of theory and practical activities, where students can practice managing and attending to a casualty.

Students are further provided the opportunity to participate in a certified First Aid Training course held by Re:Viva, where students can receive their Basic First Aid and CPR certificate. This meant once the course was finished and students had passed the assessment, they would be qualified to provide cardiopulmonary resuscitation, basic emergency life support and first aid. The course was run by an amazing instructor who has had many years of experience instructing first aid courses across many schools in NSW.

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The day was divided into three sessions and began with students learning about the techniques and essentials of applying Cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR). The instructor was able to provide personal experiences and stories which captivated the year 11 students. After multiple discussions with students applying and consolidating their existing knowledge from the unit taught at school, and enhancing it further, it was time to put the skills to the test! Students were divided into pairs and given an adult and baby manikin to practice their CPR technique on. All the students were successful in displaying the correct technique, whilst also being able to remain focussed despite the song 'Staying Alive' being played as rhythm finder. Not only was this entertaining to observe, but comforting in knowing our students could maintain life whilst fighting the distraction of an all time classic hit!

The second session focussed on applying first aid techniques in dangerous scenarios. Their partner would need to enter the situation, apply DRSABCD (which was covered in both class and the course), and successfully navigate and provide first aid to the victim. On both occasions of students playing the role of First Aider and Casualty, they were extremely successful and this led us into our third and final session for the day.

The final session focussed on the remainder of initial treatments to various injuries. This included burns, bites, stings, anaphylaxis and asthma treatment and handling motorbike accidents. The students again successfully practiced the application of an Epi-Pen and an asthma-reliever and studied the various methods of treating other potential injuries. This concluded the course, however, the students and teachers still needed to sit the final exam in order to pass the course and gain their official certificate. Overall, the day was considered a great success with every student gaining their certificate in which they can take into the real world, add it to their list of skills and improve their potential to successfully enter the workforce.

Congratulations to all these students who represented their school and zone with pride.



YEAR 7




YEAR 8






YEAR 8 - MATHS EXTENSION

The students have been challenging themselves through engaging in speed tests of the topics in every lesson, analyzing and solving problems thouroughly ranging from easy to difficult level. Their ability to sketch graphs for quadratic equations was assessed through creating their own lesson on a particular topic of Non-linear relationship they chose by the end of Term 3.






YEAR 8 - MONEY MATTERS



YEAR 9 5.1

This Term Year 9 5.1 Mathematics classes continued to work on Numeracy Ninjas to build their numeracy skills. The topics they focussed this term are Financial Mathematics and Linear relationships. Year 9 had an opportunity to work on the project "Funding the Future" where they investigated entry level salaries for different jobs and chose two jobs that they are interested in. They used the salary to convert into weekly,





fortnightly and monthly basis. They also learnt how to calculate tax payable using the Tax table. Students also planned their budget to purchase a car and compare their savings. Finally using the savings they learnt how to calculate Simple Interest and their final amount at the end of the time period of their savings. It was a great project that made students think about making decisions regarding monetary choices and plans for their budgets.

YEAR 9 5.3 - 5.2

In Term 3, year 9 5.3-5.2 classes focussed building their skills in Indices, Single Variable Data Analysis and Probability. They had an opportunity to see and analyse data and represent the data in different graphs. Every fortnight the students also work on Smartermaths to build their numeracy skills. Year 9 Davinci worked on challenging activities as "Do Now" at the beginning of the lessons to focus on their problem solving skills. Students had great opportunities this term learning on different concepts and will be able to display these learning in their Assessment Task in Week 9.







YEAR 10 5,1


This term in Stage 5.1 Mathematics the year 10's have been working hard recognising similar and congruent figures and how to convert a range of units of measurement. Students spent time recognising the importance of converting units of time, particularly measurement and practised using these conversions alongside their newfound knowledge of ratios to read and interpret house plans to find the correct real measurements.

Recently they have discovered the uses of trigonometry and how we can use right triangles to find lengths and angles. Students could then apply this knowledge to find the height of a mountain without climbing it, or the width of a river without getting wet. Using trigonometry to find angles using degree, minutes and seconds means they can calculate accurate directions. Trigonometry is a difficult topic but the students did well and practised hard to understand the concepts.


YEAR 10 5.2

This term in 10 5.2 mathematics students put so much effort on exploring trigonometry. Through in-class assignment, students apply the knowledge to measure and calculate high objects such as buildings and trees. They can also navigate the bearing distance of locations in Plumpton using the bearings and trigonometry. This becomes a unique opportunity for students to recognise the application of mathematics in authentic scenarios.


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
YEAR 10 5.3

This term year 10 5.3 were learning about the importance of Mathematics in every-day life. Like building and measurement that coincide with Geometrical figures. We proved different properties of quadrilaterals using congruent triangles tests. Also we proved some circle geometry theorems . We found and used scale factors of similar figures and triangles. Then we learnt about indices and surds, their applications and how to simplify Algebraic fractions and surds using index laws. We also learnt Trigonometry right-Angled and non Right-Angled Trigonometry. And ofcourse Pythagoras and its relation to the cosine rule. Students are researching many applications of these concepts which they will discover during their research.





YEAR 11 - MATHEMATICS STANDARD


This term Year 11 Mathematics Standard students studied Data Analysis, Probability and Financial Mathematics. As a team we looked at ways of representing data and then analyzing data using spread. Students also studied to identify outliers. We then moved onto calculating probabilities by drawing tree diagrams and two way tables. With a concept of "Money Matters", financial mathematics provided real life applications of budgeting, investments and loans. Students also completed a set homework task each week with questions similar to HSC examination for Mathematics standard 2. Four mock tests were used to prepare students for the Yearly Mathematics Examination. Teachers took time to mark and provide feedback to students. Many students turned to the extra study sessions offered by the teachers of Year 11.



YEAR 11 - MATHEMATICS ADVANCED

This term the student learnt about Discrete Probability and Exponential and Logarithmic functions. In the topic Probability, the students have been challenged by all the vocabulary and intrigued by Conditional Probability. Throughout the term the students were exposed to HSC type questions through 'Do Now' activities; preparing them for Yearly Examination. At the end of the term; in weeks 8 and 9 the students did their Yearly Examination.




YEAR 11 - NUMERACY

This term we continued adding to our numeracy skills while looking at the context of Driving and getting a license. We investigated the Learner's driving manual and searched for different measurements we needed to be able to estimate when driving. From the safe distance to being behind a truck in wet weather to the amount of space needed to leave before and after a bus stop, the students estimated a range of distances and then measured them to see who could estimate the best.

We also investigated other road and driving rules around the world like various breathalyzer readings from different countries and the laws that surround them.

Finally we are getting towards the end of our Footy Tipping competition with the lead changing many times and a photo finish may be in order. We are improving our ability to find averages and estimate future scoring points from data collected in each of the rounds.




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
YEAR 12 - NUMERACY

In Term 3, the students had a chance to look into the topic of Rates and Ratios via solving different types of everyday Rates and Ratios word problems including everyday problems involving best buys, dividing a

quantity in a given ratio, scale drawings, rates of speed and currency conversions. Their ability to solve everyday life Rates and Ratios questions was assessed through creating then solving a Tarsia puzzle involving 15 questions that covers all types of Rates and Ratios questions they did in class.









YEAR 12 - MATHEMATICS ADVANCED


This is the final term for students in Mathematics Advanced to study Mathematics at Plumpton High School. The first four weeks were used to learn Statistical Analysis and Normal Distribution with focus on Continuous Probability Distribution Functions. Students then completed their final Task as a class test in Week 5. The rest of the term was used to prepare for HSC with a major focus on practicing HSC type questions based on student strengths and topics of improvement. Students have been completing mock tests, marking and then implementing feedback into their learning.











YEAR 12 - MATHEMATICS STANDARD 1

As we move to the end of our Mathematical adventures in High School, we focus on our final topic: Bivariate Data (Statistics!). It was the job of the students to come up with an investigative question to compare two variables and then collect, organise, analyse, represent and report on the data in a final assessment. Students discovered links between the length of a person's eyebrow and the length of their ear are closely related. They also discovered that the number of hours that teachers worked during the day was not related to the number of hours they worked at home. There were lots of surprising results all around (and it was all backed up by data!)

After our final assignment we decided to look at some of the mathematics surrounding sport and created our own NRL super teams without thought to the salary cap (some of these teams were monsters!). As this is the last time I will get to write for these students, I would like to shout out the hard work these students have put in over the past two years. With COVID lockdowns and learning from home, it has not been easy (when is Year 12 ever easy), but they have pushed through and come out the end with accomplishment of completing the course. I am proud of the work they have done and hope they can use some of the skills they have acquired in their time at Plumpton High School to good effect and prosperity in the future. Good luck guys!



YEAR 12 - MATHEMATICS STANDARD 2

This term we did our last topic for the year and the last assessment task. We studied Bivariate data and used technology (Excel and Desmos) to plot graphs. We learnt how sometimes two variables could be well correlated by finding the correlation coefficient. We drew lines of best fits by eye and by calculating the vertical intercepts and the gradient using functions on the calculator. We also discussed causation vs correlation.

In the time left we were revising the content of each topic with some questions from previous exams to prepare for the coming HSC exam. We are using all resources given to


YEAR 8 CHINESE

Enrolment and continuation at Plumpton High School (PHS) is in part conditional on the preparedness to abide by the school policies including those relating to school uniform requirements.

Year 7 to Year 9 uniform

Girls: white PHS crested polo, black or tartan skirt, black 3/4 shorts or black pants, tartan dress, red PHS crested jumper, and black leather shoes.

Boys: white PHS crested polo and black shorts or pants, red PHS crested jumper, and black leather shoes.

Year 10 to Year 12 uniform

Girls: white PHS crested senior blouse and tartan skirt, tartan shorts or black long pants, tartan dress PHS crested jumper, and black leather shoes.

Boys: white PHS crested senior shirt, black shorts or pants, red PHS crested jumper, and black leather shoes.

Note: Tie is optional and blazer is for prefects or other school events and will be given out when needed.

Sports uniforms must not be worn to school. Students are to bring this in their bags and change into it when they have PDHPE or sport.

Uniform detentions may occur for students out of uniform.

If a student is out of uniform for a short period they need to see the office with a note or phone call from home and get a green uniform note.

All black pants and shorts must be plain black with no stripes.

Non-uniform items include: Tights, short shorts, denim, and any other jumpers and must not be worn.

What do I do if I need to pick my child up early or if they have an appointment and will return?

Year 7 to Year 9 Uniform

Girls: white PHS crested polo, black skirt, black 3/4 shorts or black pants, red PHS crested jumper and black leather shoes, white ankle socks or black stockings.

Boys: white PHS crested polo and black shorts or pants, red PHS crested jumper, white ankle socks and black leather shoes.

Year 10 to Year 12 Uniform

Girls: white PHS crested senior blouse and tartan skirt, shorts or black long pants, PHS crested jumper, white ankle socks or black stockings and black leather shoes.

Boys: white PHS crested senior shirt, black shorts or pants, red PHS crested jumper, white ankle socks and black leather shoes.

All black pants and shorts must be plain black with no stripes. Tights, short shorts, denim and any other jumpers are not school uniform and must not be worn. Sport uniform must not be worn to school. Students are to bring this in their bags and change into it when they have PDHPE or sport.

Uniform detentions may occur for students out of uniform.

We have to make sure we have good systems in place to prevent such things from negatively affecting our lives at school and our learning. Some of the consequences for people behaving badly include:

- Warnings and action by your teacher if you fail to meet the behaviour standards.
- Referral to the head teacher for action if the problem persists.

ACHIEVING HIGH BEHAVIOUR STANDARDS TOGETHER

We all have a shared responsibility to help the learning and wellbeing of the large majority of students. To do this we need to re-establish our standards in a number of focus areas.

It must be clearly understood that there will be concequences for people who fail to meet the behaviour standards outlined in the document.

We cannot accept behaviours which impact negatively on our school learning environment. We each have a responsibility to be the best learners, citizens, and leaders we can be. We must respect the wellbeing of others and the learning of others
